Both myths had elements of truth, but the reality was both more complex and more interesting. Drawing on Whitley's Theory of Scientific Change, the study analysed the degree of 'professionalisation' of the Information Systems Discipline, the overarching research question being 'To what extent is Information Systems a distinct and mature discipline in Australia?' The book chapters are structured around three main sections: a) the context of the study; b) the state case studies; and c) Australia-wide evidence and analysis. The book is crafted to be accessible to IS and non-IS types both within and outside of Australia. It represents a 'check point'; a snapshot at a point in time. As the first in a hoped for series of such snap-shots, it includes a brief history of IS in Australia, bringing us up to the time of this report. The editorial team comprises Guy Gable, architect and leader; Bob Smyth, project manager; Shirley Gregor, sponsor, host and co-theoretician; Roger Clarke, discipline memory; and Gail Ridley,

theoretician. In phase two, the editors undertook to examine each component study, with a view to arriving at an Australia-wide perspective. Victorian Britain is often considered as the high point of 'laissez-faire', the place and the time when people were most 'free' to make their own lives without the aid or interference of the State. This book explores the truth of that assumption and what it might mean. It considers what the Victorian State did or did not do, what were the prevailing definitions and practices of 'liberty', what other sources of discipline and authority existed beyond the State to structure people's lives - in sum, what were the broad conditions under which such a profound belief in 'liberty' could flourish, and a complex society be run on those principles. Contributors include leading scholars in British political, social and cultural history, so that 'liberty' is seen in the round, not just as a set of ideas or of political slogans, but also as a public and private philosophy that structured everyday life. Consideration is also given to the full range of British subjects in the nineteenth century - men, women, people of all classes, from all parts of the British Isles - and to placing the British experience in a global and comparative perspective. Behind the facade of piety and respectability, the true face of Victorian England was rather more dirty. In these three kinky, sexy, twisted tales, submission is demanded and innocence is despoiled. Are you ready to see the Dark Hearts and Dirty Secrets of the Victorian Age?

So, innocent Beatrice finds herself inside the stranger's carriage, helpless before his depraved desires. As her innocence ebbs away, Beatrice's own appetites awaken, and she embraces the wanton hussy inside of her.

Story 3: Her Lesson in Discipline Leticia is a spoiled, wild child. She cannot be tamed, and she laughs in the face of propriety. Her family are in despair and Leticia doesn't give a damn. So they send her for discipline elsewhere, to an institution that specializes in making naughty young ladies see the error of their ways. Leticia is defiant, and finds herself in the office and then bent over the knees of the stern headmaster. He will teach her a special kind of discipline and awaken in her a desire that she never thought possible... ~~~~~ PG Excerpt ~~~~~ "Love?
