home and in her

reflection of the one
she lived? Like
many compelling
and true tales, The
Convert is stranger
than fiction. It is a
gripping account of
a life lived on the
radical edge and a
profound
meditation on the
cultural conflicts
that frustrate
mutual
understanding. On
its first appearance
in 1957, Hugh and
Graham Greene's
The Spy's Bedside
Book provoked a
storm of interest,
and, perhaps
unsurprisingly, 100
copies were bought
by East German
Intelligence. This
classic anthology,
with a new
introduction by the
former head of MI5,

Stella Rimington, includes stories by some of the great writers on spying and many practitioners, including Ian Fleming and John Buchan, Sir Robert Baden-Powell and Belle Boyd, Walter Schellenberg and Major André, Sir Paul Dukes and Vladimir Petrov, and. from the golden age of mystery and suspense, William Le Queux and E. Phillips Oppenheim. There are also some unexpected figures: William Blake, D.H. Lawrence and Thomas Mann, all suspected of spying in three great wars. How can you hide messages in a boiled egg? Why should you always put pepper in your vodka when in

Russia? Answers to these questions and much more can be found in this thrilling collection, which will enthral readers once again with its tales of espionage from a bygone era. Driven away from his parish by a censorious bishop, Monsignor Quixote sets off across Spain accompanied by a deposed renegade mayor as his own Sancho Panza, and his noble steed Rocinante - a faithful but antiquated SEAT 600. Like Cervantes's classic, this comic, picaresque fable offers enduring insights into our life and times. Graham Greene proves a wonderful storyteller in this

hilarious tale of the eccentricity of families and the pomposity of the middle class. Henry Pulling, a retired bank manager, meets his septuagenarian Aunt Augusta for the first time in over fifty years at what he supposes to be his mother's funeral. Soon after, she persuades Henry to abandon Southwood, his dahlias and the Major next door to travel her way, Brighton, Paris, Istanbul, Paraguay. Through Aunt Augusta, a veteran of Europe's hotel bedrooms, Henry joins a shiftless, twilight society: mixing with hippies, war criminals, CIA men; smoking pot, breaking all the currency

regulations and eventually coming alive after a dull suburban life. In *Travels with my Aunt Graham* Greene not only gives us intoxicating entertainment but also confronts us with some of the most perplexing of human dilemmas. In *Narrative Strategies* Roston focuses upon the Greene's texts themselves and their manipulation of reader response, highlighting the innovative strategies that Greene developed to cope with the mid-century invalidation of the traditional hero. The result is a stimulating new reading of the major novels. In 1936, Graham

continental country civil war is raging. Once a lecturer in medieval French, now a government agent, D is a scarred stranger in England, sent on a mission to buy coal at any price. Better Reading Graham Greene was always deeply interested in the role played by the subconscious in his writing, and the private world of his dreams was one that he nurtured carefully, recording it almost daily in his dream diaries.

Selecting from these dream diaries, he prepared this small treasure for publication just before his death in 1991— a last gift from a great writer to delight and entertain his readers. Collected Essays contains nearly eighty essays, reviews and occasional pieces composed between novels, plays and travel books over four prolific decades. From Henry James and Somerset Maugham to Ho Chi Minh and Kim Philby, the range of subjects is eclectic and stimulating; his subjects brought vividly to life. The resulting collection is as revealing as autobiography and characteristically rich in humour,

insight and doubt. This is the story of Francis Andrews, a young man whose betrayal of his fellow smugglers has left a man dead. Fearing vengeance, he flees and takes refuge in the house of a young, isolated woman who persuades him to give evidence against his accomplices in court. But neither she nor Andrews is aware that to both criminals and authority, treachery is as great a crime as smuggling. Graham Greene's early books are described as 'Catholic Novels' with his later work falling into political and detective genres. This title argues that this is a false dichotomy created by a

narrowly prescriptive understanding of the Catholic genre and obscures the impact of Greene's religious imagination on his literary art. Graham Greene's blackly comic espionage thriller, set amid the vice and squalor of pre-revolutionary Havana. Life in pre-revolutionary Cuba is not easy and James Wormold, a failing vacuum cleaner salesman, is struggling to fund the increasingly lavish lifestyle of his manipulative sixteen year-old daughter, Milly. So when an enigmatic Englishman offers him an extra income in return for a little spying, he is sorely tempted... But when the fake reports he's been

sending to London start to come true, Havana suddenly becomes a very dangerous place indeed. Both a brilliant Cold War thriller and hilarious work of satire, Greene's classic tale of an accidental spy is a truly gripping read. Graham Greene once wrote that «Innocence is a

kind of insanity.» This book examines the many shades of innocence in Greene's characters: the «blank innocence, » «depraved innocence, » and «absurd innocence» of Anthony Farrant; the piteous innocence of Pinkie; the simple innocence of Raven; the pure innocence of Father Quixote; the paradoxical innocence of the Whisky Priest; the inverted innocence of Sarah Miles; the faithful innocence of Father Rivas, the Dog-Ears Priest; the intrusive innocence of Doctor Fischer; and the playful innocence of Harry Lime. The complex concept of innocence is found to be a prevailing theme in Greene's

novels. This discussion of Graham Greene's faith uses Monsignor Quixote, one of Greene's later novels, as a departure point to discuss the author's faith in both secular and divine terms. The scholars involved in this project wanted to explore innocence and experience, peace and war, love and hate in Greene's richly human literary tapestry. Greene's Christianity (or lack of it) is explored, as are his major novels and their often bleak and tatty settings. The novels discussed include Brighton Rock, The Power and the Glory, The End of the Affair, The Honorary Consul, Dr Fischer of

Geneva and, of course, Monsignor Quixote. Among the international scholars included in this collection are Mark Bosco, SJ, Debanjan Chakrabarti, Peter Christensen, Thomas Dobozy, Fr. Leopoldo Duran, Berta Cano Echevarra, Cedric Watts, B.L. Thomson and Thomas Hill. Thomas Hill is author of Graham Greene's Wanderers and senior professor at Sophia University's Department of Literature. Early one morning the little train wakes up in his home town, Little Snoreing, and decides to go on an adventure. He chugs and puffs his way through villages, past castles and over

bridges. But soon he gets tired, and the big city is a bit scary... there's only one thing for it; he'll have to head back! THE LITTLE TRAIN, Graham Greene's first children's book, was originally published in 1946 with Ardizzone's illustrations commissioned 28 year later. First published by The Bodley Head in 1974, this new edition brings the classic little train back to life for a whole new generation. During World War II a group of men is held prisoner by the Germans, who determine that three of them must die. This is the story of how one of those men trades his wealth for his

life--and lives to pay for his act in utterly unexpected ways. A young boy, Victor, is collected from school by a stranger in a bowler hat - the stranger says he has won Victor in a game of backgammon with Victor's father. The stranger, known as the Captain, takes Victor to live with the sweet but withdrawn Lisa, where he serves as her conduit to the outside world. From mysterious beginnings, Graham Greene's final novel becomes a twisting thriller of smuggling, jewel theft and international espionage which culminates in a dramatic showdown in Panama. The symposium -

Graham Greene in Perspective- held on 22-23 November 1990 at the University of Mainz has brought together scholars from Britain, France and Germany whose special interest is Graham Greene's literary achievement. Their lectures and analyses are assembled in this volume of -Anglo-American Studies-. They are concerned with major themes in the novels of the 40s and the 50s (Peter Erlebach), -Knowing- in "Brighton Rock" (Jean-Yves Monnier), the two worlds of "Travels with my Aunt" (Volker Schulz), the image of the novelist (Nigel Wood), the

adaptation for the cinema (Ann Piroelle), Greene as Catholic novelist (Heinz Antor), "The Comedians" (Dorothea Barrett), dimensions of political experience (Uwe Boker), escape and liberation (Paul O'Prey), "Monsignor Quixote" (Wolfgang G. Muller), "The Human Factor" (Thomas M. Stein) and postmodern features in Graham Greene's novels (Grahame Smith)."

This study reveals Greene in a dual role as author, one who projects literary experience into his view of life and subsequently projects both his experience and its "literary" interpretation into his fiction; and it

defines two phases of Greenes novels through the changing relationship between writer and protagonists. The first phase progresses from acutely sensitive, self-divided young men somewhat like the young Greene to embittered, alienated characters ostensibly at great distance from their creator. The second phase (1939) includes a series of "portraits of the artist" through which Greene confronts more directly the tensions and conflicts of his private life. A record of the last years of Graham Greene's life, in which he agonized over his faith. Many

of the debates recorded in *Monsignor Quixote* were actually conducted with the author, Fr Duran. For 27 years, he was probably the closest friend of the novelist.
